THE KINGFISHERS
(premiere)
a poem by Charles Olson

Staged and Performed by Richard Haisma

Charles Olson (1910-1970) spent most of his life in the seaport town of Gloucester, Mass. He was rector of Black Mountain College from 1951-56, a time when John Cage, Merce Cunningham, Buckminster Fuller, Robert Creeley, and Robert Duncan were there teaching and performing. He wrote "The Kingfishers" in 1949 in part to distinguish his own direction in poetry from that of "Reverend" T.S. Eliot and in part to counter the chic pessimism contained in Eliot's "The Wasteland". Both poems are images of a civilization in decay, but Olson's actually contains the process and seeds of natural renewal.

Music: Excerpts from "Rosari" by Pau (Pablo) Casals, sung by the Escolania (and choir) of Montserrat (Catalunya); "Concert Pieces" by Couperin and "Song of the Birds" (Catalan folksong) performed by Pau Casals with pianist Mieczyslaw Horszowski, recorded live at a White House concert, November 1961.

Music notes: The distinctly personal style Casals brings to the Couperin music is also intrinsically expressive of his beloved Catalan homeland. Deeply disappointed when the allies would not carry their fight against facism into Spain, he refused to perform in the U.S. and denied himself even setting foot on Spanish soil as long as Franco was in power. He relented, however, on one of these resolves at an invitation from President Kennedy to perform at the White House, resulting in the recording from which the cello works are taken. (He wrote "Rosari" for the Monserrat Escolania, the 2nd oldest boys choir in Europe.) As was his tradition, he ended the concert with the Catalan folksong, "Song of the Birds", which we continue here for bows and into...
