## Part I: PASOS (World Premiere) 32 minut

Historic background: Martin Alonso Pinzon was a leading mariner of the town of Palos, which supplied most the seamer for the 1492 voyage. Captain of the caravel Pinta, Pinzon rac Colon (Columbus) back to Spain in hopes of gaining credit fo the new world discovery but was rebuked by Isabella. Shortly after returning, he died in self-imposed isolation. In PASOS, Pinzon spends his last day reflecting on the path that lead fro the end of the old world to the edge of the new.

#### Part II: LOST 30 minutes

Historic backgrond: In 1587, England made its first attempt to colonize North America at Roanoke Island, North Carolina, under the governorship of John White. Shortly after landing, White's granddaughter, Virginia Dare was born. Soon after that he went back to England for supplies. White did not return for three years. When he finally arrived, the colony had vanished, leaving a pre-arranged message: CROATOAN (a nearby Indian tribe) carved in a tree. The clue was never followed up and the colony's fate remains a mystery.

The Synergic Theater has been under the continuing direction of dancer/choreographer Suzanne White Manning and writer/media designer David Manning since its premiere performances in 1974 with the US/USSR Summer Arts Festival in Durham, NC. Currently based in New York, they have also worked extensively in San Francisco and NC; performing at the Herbst Theater, Project Artaud, Julia Morgan Center,

Margaret Jenkins Performance Space, Reynolds Theater, Page Auditorium, Stewart Theater and the Ark; as well as the Marymount Manhattan Theater, Schaeberle Studio Theater and Schimmel Center for the Arts in NYC. Their workshops at Duke University in the mid-1970's paved the way for the American Dance Festival's move there in 1978. Since 1987, they have been presenting semi-annual workshops and home season productions in a facilities-use residency at Pace University. The co-directors have also been in-residence with Duke's Institute of the Arts, presented their workshop at SUNY-Stonybrook, and the entire company was in-residence working on the production at Cedar Crest College last July. TERRA INCOGNITA is available for touring through 1992.

Suzanne White Manning has, in addition to her work with the Synergic Theater, presented/been presented through the Chamber Dance Group, the Cubiculo, SF Bay Area Dance Coalition Choreographers' Concerts, NC Dance Showcase, Compania de Avelina Arguelles. She is currently on the faculties of Pace University and the Ernie Martin Studio Theater; has also been on the dance faculty of Duke University, Special Programs faculty of LIMS, founding faculty of the Bay Area Institute of Movement Studies and served year-long appointments with the Instituto del Teatro de Barcelona and the UNC-Greensboro Dance Department. She is a Certified Movement Analyst and has an MA in Dance from UCLA, which she would like to acknowledge as the source of her ensuing professional pursuit of multi-dimensional dancetheater forms.

David Manning is a freelance writer and media designer, in addition to co-directing the Synergic Theater. He has written/produced/edited/directed professionally for film, broadcast, A-V, theatrical and print media. Among other work, he is the author of "Self-Image, which was produced by the Radio Repertory Company for national distribution; collaborated with composer Michael Ching on a narrated musical satire commissioned by the U.S. Olympic Festival; written numerous short stories, commentaries, articles and several novels; and has served as Marketing Director for the American Dance Festival and NC Folklife Festival, Executive Director of the Balasaraswati School of Indian Music & Dance in Berkeley, and has a BA in History from Duke.
